Executive Summary

This program offer is a pass-through for the City of Portland ACCESS program. The purpose is to provide three residential treatment beds for those individuals identified by the Portland Police Bureau as chronic criminal offenders (with primary addiction issues) who have the greatest need for, and demonstrate the most potential benefit from, a residential treatment program. Most of the potential clients live in the downtown area and are homeless.

Although these three beds will not necessarily be used by people on probation or parole, they will assist with maintaining residential treatment capacity within the community.

Program Description

The City of Portland identified CODA Inc as the treatment provider of choice. DCJ will be on the oversight committee for the ACCESS Drug and Alcohol Project. DCJ will provide the contract management, administrative support and quality assurance for the three beds at CODA Inc.

The majority of Portland ACCESS participants will receive housing and case management through Central City Concern. This is a small project for those people who are assessed as needing residential treatment as the primary treatment experience.

The treatment provider will be in close contact with both the case manager who is a City of Portland employee and staff from Cental City City Concern. When clients complete residential treatment they will have an opportunity to be housed at Central City's transitional housing, and eventually placed in permanent housing.

Program Justification

Residential treatment is directly linked to the Safety Team strategy of treating drug and alcohol addiction. During 2003, 73% of the adult males arrested and booked in the Multnomah County jail tested positive for drugs. A National Institute of Justice report indicates that more than 50% of violent crimes involve drug use on the part of the perpetrator and sometimes the victim. We know from an internal evaluation of residential treatment that of those exiting treatment in 2003 there was a 20% reduction in one year pre/post program participation arrest rates. Further, those who exited and had a length of stay greater than 90 days had a 32% reduction in one year pre/post program participation arrest rates.
